Programme Notes

<u> Paul Dooley - Manifestos</u>

Commissioned by the wind bands of the Big 12 Conference, *Manifestos* is a three-movement work inspired by the early 20th-century avant-garde movement Futurism

The piece reflects the energy, dynamism, and radical spirit of Futurist artists, who sought to break from tradition and embrace modernity, speed, and technology. Each movement explores different facets of this aesthetic: "Aero-Poem" evokes flight and motion; "Futurist Flowers" blends mechanical precision with organic imagery; and "Star Dancer + Her School of Dance" celebrates kinetic expression. Dooley's music channels the bold proclamations of Futurist manifestos, using vibrant orchestration and rhythmic vitality to mirror the movement's obsession with progress and transformation. The work is both a tribute to and a reinterpretation of Futurism's artistic legacy.

David Maslanka - Traveler

Traveler was commissioned to honor Ray C. Lichtenwalter's retirement from the University of Texas at Arlington

Maslanka's program note describes the piece as a reflection on life's journey, beginning with the chorale "Nicht so traurig, nicht so sehr" ("Not so sad, not so much"), symbolizing a life in full stride. The music transitions from energetic motion to meditative calm, suggesting a soul preparing for its next step. Maslanka writes, "We travel from life to life to life, in time and eternity," capturing a sense of spiritual continuity and transformation. The work's emotional arc and lyrical depth make it a poignant farewell and celebration of life.

Jennifer Higdon – Blue Cathedral

Commissioned by the Curtis Institute of Music to mark its 75th anniversary, Blue Cathedral is Jennifer Higdon's deeply personal meditation on life, loss, and transcendence

Written after the death of her brother Andrew Blue, the piece imagines a journey through a glass cathedral in the sky. The music begins with quiet contemplation and gradually ascends toward ecstatic celebration. Higdon features solos for flute (her instrument) and clarinet (her brother's), symbolizing their relationship. The clarinet continues alone at the end, representing Andrew's onward journey. The work's shimmering textures and spiritual resonance have made it one of the most performed contemporary orchestral pieces.

<u> Paul Hindemith – Symphony in B-flat</u>

Composed for the United States Army Band and premiered with Hindemith conducting, this symphony is a landmark in wind band literature

Structured in three movements, it showcases Hindemith's contrapuntal mastery and thematic development. The first movement follows a sonata-allegro form, blending themes in vigorous counterpoint. The second features a lyrical duet between alto saxophone and cornet, while the third culminates in a fugue that revisits earlier motifs. The symphony's complexity and orchestral scope helped legitimize the concert band as a serious medium, influencing future composers to write for winds. Its rhythmic vitality and formal clarity remain exemplary in the repertoire.
